Twelve Concepts for NA Service


- 1. To fulfill our fellowship's primary purpose, the NA groups have joined together to create a structure which develops, coordinates, and maintains services on behalf of NA as a whole.
- The final responsibility and authority for NA services rests with the NA groups. 2.
- The NA groups delegate to the service structure the authority necessary to fulfill the responsibilities assigned to it. 3.
